





Inflammatory Bowel Disease Standardized Care Protocols

7. INITIATION OF THIOPURINES

Nurse:

- 1. Prior to starting therapy, the patient must have the following completed:
 - Skin exam to be performed by family physician
 - EBV IgG screening, if the patient is less than 23 years old
- 2. At the time of the medication initiation appointment, the patient is to be given:
 - A patient information sheet and instructions for taking the medication (#1, #2 & #3) (PACE QPI 22,23)
 - Bloodwork requisitions:
 - A new start Thiopurine lab requisition to be done every week for 4 weeks (#4), and a monthly standing order to complete for the first year of therapy (#5). After the first year, if there are no issues, the standing order can be done every 2-3 months. (PACE QPI 12)
 - 6-TG and 6-MMP levels to be done after 4 wks on a stable dose i.e. 10 weeks after starting (physician discretion)(#6 & #7)
 - Standard follow-up appointment bloodwork to be done 1 week before his/her next follow-up appointment (#8)
 - Collection kit for fecal calprotectin (#9) or fecal calprotectin for patients on Humira (#10) sample to be brought in at 14 week follow-up appointment.
- 3. After the patient has been on a thiopurine for 14 weeks, and the thiopurine labs and 6TG/6MMP labs (optional) have come in and been reviewed by the nurse, the nurse will call the patient to ensure response to the medication, utilizing the telephone interview (#11) and HBI (#12) or Partial Mayo (#13). (PACE QPI 15)
- 4. If there is response, continue with thiopurine therapy. If there is not adequate response, then consult with the physician.
- 5. Send a message to support staff to make a follow-up appointment after 14 weeks to assess response.

Support Staff:

- 1. Arrange a follow-up clinic appointment at 14 weeks as per the nurse message. If the patient has misplaced his/her standard follow-up bloodwork requisition, be sure to send them one (via email, fax or mail) to complete before their appointment.
- 2. If there is no physical appointment available, reply to the nurse's message to let him/her know they will need to call the patient to do a phone assessment at 14 weeks.

Physician Guided:

1. If the patient is not adequately responding to the medication, then optimize therapy.







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
